Supporting institutions and key stakeholders to prepare for and respond to migration flows related emergencies and crises, as well as movements of people due to climate change and protection of those affected.

Promoting pathways for regular migration and alternatives to irregular migration through participatory, evidence-based communication initiatives and campaigns, as well as advocating for a balanced narrative on migration.

# WHAT MAKES WHP UNIQUE?

> WHP has *unprecedented depth*, having strategically engaged and over time built strong relationships with:



close to **150** various national government agencies<sup>1</sup>;



close to **50** provincial and municipal governments in seven countries;



close to **70** local communities in six countries, all situated on key regional migratory routes;



more than **90** civil society organizations, academic institutions, and private sector entities;



major **UN** Agencies and international organizations active in the region, and



close to a **dozen** regional fora promoting regional dialogue, cooperation, alignment, and integration.

- > The Program has demonstrated *exceptional flexibility* in responding to dynamic circumstances and new national and regional priorities or adapting and evolving to leverage its impact in a changing political environment.
- > WHP *leverages the regional perspective* to achieve progress at the local, national, bilateral, and multilateral levels.
- > WHP's special emphasis on evidence-based solutions has fundamentally contributed to make IOM *the largest repository of unique data and knowledge* on migration in the region.
- A defining feature of WHP has always been its direct line to migrants and communities through the key outcome area focused on *communication*. It was the first program in the region to use the Communication for Development (C4D) capacity-building and social-behavioral change approach.
