


The General Directorate of Migration (DGME) and IOM Contribute to the Fulfillment of the Rights of Children in El Salvador

IOM, the UN Migration Agency, and the General Directorate of Migration (DGME) of El Salvador presented Protocol of Action and the Care Coordination for and Protection of Foreign Migrant Children and Adolescents. The protocol will allow the Salvadoran the government to advance in guarantee and fulfilment of the fundamental rights of this population present on Salvadoran territory.

The protocol was designed within the framework of the Principle of Best Interest, which establishes that in all decisions that affect children and adolescents, including those who are migrants, their physical, spiritual, psychological, moral and social development is prioritized so as to achieve the full and harmonious development of their personality (established in the Convention on the Rights of the Child and the Law on the Comprehensive Protection of Children and Adolescents LEPINA).



Shelters and information hubs for migrants in Guatemala use the MigrantApp


